Borough Council is pleased to welcome the newest full-time officer with the Malvern Police Department, Tyler Bury. Ofc. Bury has served with the Police Department for nearly two years as a part-time officer and was promoted to full-time on June 5, 2018. He was also in-


strumental in apprehending the suspects involved in the recent burglary of a store on Lancaster Avenue who fled into the Borough. We are thankful to have him with the Police Department.

There is a new trash and recycling company servicing the residents of Malvern Borough. At the May 15, 2018 meeting, Borough Council awarded the contract for trash and recycling collection to Charles Blosenski Disposal

News from the Codes Enforcement Officer

Hedges, Bushes, Flowers and Trees Along Sidewalks, Walkways

As the hedges, bushes, and flowers grow along the sidewalk at your property please make sure that they don't spread to the point where they obstruct the side-

walk. This makes it difficult, not to mention dangerous, for pedestrians who use the sidewalks. In addition, where vegetation is planted near road intersections, it's important to keep them trimmed back so they don't become a sight hazard to motorists attempting to go through those intersections.

If you have trees that hang over your sidewalk, please make sure that there is at least 8 feet of clearance from the sidewalk to the bottom of those branches.

A Friendly Reminder to Pet Owners

Just a friendly reminder to be courteous and respectful of your neighbors by picking up after your pets. Dog waste is more than just a smelly and unsightly mess. It's also a breeding ground for bacteria and parasites, all of which are common-

ly found in dog feces and are easily transferable upon contact.

Borough Code, Chapter 68-6 specifically sites that dog owners are to clean up after their pets on any sidewalk, pathway, play area, park or any place where people

congregate, or on any private property. Any one observed violating this section of the Code could face fines and associated court fees if found guilty. Although this may not be a pleasant chore, it is the responsibility of a pet owner.

News from the Malvern Fire Company

The Malvern Fire Company has placed into service a 2018 Spartan Metro Star Engine. The engine has a full complement of engine company tools, a Thermal Imaging Camera, CO and Gas Meters and medical equipment. The engine will be the first out on all building related incidents, CO alarms and certain fire type incidents in our local. The engine will be known as Engine 4, and was dedicated by the Company in honor of Paul Wilkins, President and past Chief.

On May 24th 2018, Senator Andrew Dinniman honored Joseph LeBresco Sr. for his 65 years in the fire service. Senator Dinniman

thanked Joe for his selfless service to help others and for being a mentor to his family and fellow firefighters. Joe is the current President of the Malvern Fire Company; he is a past Chief and has held every rank and position since joining the Malvern Fire Company in 1953. Planning Commission News

The Malvern Planning Commission (MPC) is a 'review and recommend' body of seven Borough residents which processes Subdivision and Land Use (SALDO) applications, monitors Zoning Ordinances, undertakes Planning Initiatives, and provides comments on other Community Planning matters referred to us by Borough Council.

Summer 2018 finds the MPC reviewing various SALDO applications and sketch plans, primarily in the King Street corridor, including:

- A garage and parking expansion at 124 - 128 East King

Street,

- A two-lot subdivision at 11 Griffith Avenue, and
- A rezoning and consolidation of three parcels on Channing and Woodland Avenues for St. Patrick's Parish Church and School expansion.

We are continuing a long-term planning initiative to revise definitions and processes for important Zoning Ordinance sections that have been deemed ambiguous or outdated. One Ordinance that MPC has been engaged in updating involves the keeping of livestock, specifically chickens and ducks.

Current MPC members include Dave Knies (Chair), Mark Niemiec (Vice Chair), Lynne Frederick, Geoff Rubino, Chris Mongeau, Carroll Siquett III, and Zoe Warner. Neil Lovekin - the Assistant Borough Manager - doubles as the MPC Secretary.

The Malvern Planning Commission meets on the first and third Thursdays of each month, 7:30 PM at Borough Hall. All are welcome and encouraged to attend! The status of various SALDO applications and initiatives can be viewed on the Borough website under Boards and Commissions/ Planning Commission/Case Log.



Malvern Historical Commission News

Hello, Malvernites! We have thoroughly enjoyed your engaging comments on our Facebook posts at facebook.com/MalvernHC, and encourage you to LIKE and FOLLOW our posts for our weekly trips down memory lane. Remember that with each milestone "LIKE" (such as numbers 900 or 950), that person will win some of our historic postcards!

Speaking of our postcards, we have 24 different designs currently in circulation. Each is on display on the second floor of Borough Hall, just outside the Malvern History Center and administrative offices. We have a very limited number of our Burke Park t-shirts still on hand. Other fascinating items for sale include our 125th Anniversary banners (suitable for framing, hanging, or even using as an outdoor flag), and our three in-print history books on the borough. These books are not available for purchase online!

We are still working out a new historic map for sale, which we

foresee having for the Malvern Oktoberfest on September 9th and also for the Paoli Battlefield Heritage Day on September 22nd.

If you are interested in assisting us at either event, please email us at MalvernBoroHistory@malvern.org. These events and our general meetings are a great way to learn more about the Borough's history and to get involved with preserving it! The Historical Commission currently has one opening out of our seven members. We would love to have someone who likes social media. Borough residents may apply by sending a cover letter and resume to our email and copying Malvern@malvern.org. Our regular meetings are the 2nd and 4th Tuesday evenings at 7:30 in the Heintzelman Room (or perhaps the Hibberd Room) on the second floor of Borough Hall. Meetings are public, and anyone planning on applying to our open position are encour-

aged to attend.

Our quick tidbit of history to share this newsletter: Malvern's Borough Hall was our public school from 1899 until its closure in 1981. It housed varying grades throughout the years, from kindergarten through 9th grade. Norman Heintzelman taught music and social studies while holding the elected office of school principal in the 1930s and 1940s. Josiah Hibberd taught at "the little red schoolhouse" from 1951 until 1981, also holding the position of teaching principal from 1958 onward. Two of the four rooms on the second floor of Borough Hall are named for these educators. A recent interview with a Malvern student from the late 1970s reminded us that the borough council meeting room - the Hibberd Room - was Mr. Hibberd's classroom. More information on both gentlemen may be found in our book *A Century in Malvern* by the late Nancy B. Schmitt.

Shade Tree Commission News

Over the last few years, the Borough has made over 160 shade trees available to residents free for planting. Together we're keeping Malvern green and providing lovely streetscapes. If you are interested in a free tree for your yard, please contact us at malvernstc@malvern.org. The Borough expects to continue to partner with the Pennsylvania Horticulture Society and DCNR's TreeVitalize Program to give free shade trees to qualified residents. We expect to have a selection of small, medium and large trees. In the past, trees have included redbuds, maples, hornbeams, oaks, hackberries, crabapples, cherries, tree lilacs, Katsuras, elms, Yellowwoods, filberts and London Plane trees—something for every yard, no matter how large or small.

If you have planted trees within the last 12 to 18 months, please inspect them. With tempera-

tures as hot as they've been, it can be a particularly sensitive time for new trees. If we don't get much rain, watering will be needed.

WATERING is the most critical part of protecting your new trees. Typically, supplemental water is necessary for one growing season following planting (through the following year for fall installations). Additional water may be necessary in the second year during drought and/or hot/dry conditions.

Trees need 20-25 gallons of water weekly, or the equivalent of about 1" of rainfall (a good, slow, soaking rain...not a passing shower). Using a hose end shower type nozzle or 'watering wand,' about 5 minutes 2X per week should suffice. 'Gator bags' or irrigation bags are available as well. These get filled, and drain slowly from the bottom, then get re-filled when empty. Finally, soaker hoses can be used—but you must ensure water is reach-

ing all parts of the root ball. On sloping ground this can be problematic.

So protect your new trees—water and mulch!


And be sure to bring your appetite. We'll have two food courts, one in Burke Park and one on the west end of King Street with lots of inviting food trucks.

News from the Paoli Battlefield Preservation Fund

The PAOLI BATTLEFIELD PRESERVATION FUND continues its popular Revolutionary Lecture series at the General Warren featuring special 18th Century diners and friendly interaction with noted historians and writers. The Battle of Paoli was the 9th bloodiest battle of the Revolutionary War, Remember Paoli became our nation's first battle cry and the model for American national battle cries in the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries. Home Rule Charter Amendments

Borough Council recently adopted three (3) ordinances that would initiate amendments to the Borough's Home Rule Charter. Below are summaries of the amendments:

- Ordinance No. 2018 – 1: This proposed amendment would amend section 903 of the Home Rule Charter to require that the annual budget be advertised in at

least one or more newspapers prior to final adoption.

- Ordinance No. 2018 – 2: This proposed amendment would amend section 214 of the Home Rule Charter in order to establish provisions by which members of Borough Council may participate in meetings remotely.
- Ordinance No. 2018 – 3: This proposed amendment would amend section 211 of the Home

Rule Charter in order to revise the attendance requirements for members of Borough Council.

All three (3) proposed amendments will be before the voters of Malvern Borough as a referendum on the ballot in the November General Election. Please contact the Borough administrative offices if you would to obtain copies of any of these ordinances.

News from The Malvern Police Department

2018 has been a busy year to date for the Malvern Police Department. Malvern Borough Council approved the 2018 budget which included the addition of a full-time Police Officer. Malvern Police tested qualified candidates for this position. Officer Sian Keating scored highest in the testing. Malvern Police was honored to promote Officer Sian Keating to a full-time position on April 3, 2018. Officer Keating joined the Police Department in September 2017 with 5 years Police experience. Officer Keating is the first "full-time" female Police Officer for Malvern Police Department.

The Department congratulates Officer Mark Koenig Jr. who joined the Malvern Police Department in November 2015. Officer Koenig served Malvern Police part-time until July 2017 when he was promoted to full-time. Officer Koenig was a great asset to the Malvern Police Department. In April 2018 Officer Koenig submitted his resignation stating he had accepted a position with the United States Secret Service as a Special Agent. The Department thanks you for your service to Malvern and good luck in your new position.

In April 2018 Malvern Police filled the vacancy by promoting Officer Tyler Bury to full-time position. Officer Bury joined the Malvern Police Department in March 2016 as a part-time Officer. Officer Bury has been outstanding in his role. Officer Bury was promoted to full-time on June 5, 2018.

Officer Joseph Cordone joined the Malvern Police Department in January 2004. Officer Cordone served as a part-time Officer and was promoted to full-time in June 2006. In February 2010, while on-duty serving the Malvern community, Officer Cordone suffered an injury to his ankle. This injury would prove to be a career ending injury. In July of 2017 Officer Cordone began to experience pain in this ankle. After a year of attempting to rehab the injury, Officer Cordone was medically advised he could no longer perform the duty of a Police

Officer. In June 2018 Officer Cordone retired due to the injury. I wish Officer Cordone luck in his future and thank him for his committed 14 years of service.

At the June 5, 2018 Council Meeting, two Officers received Commendation Awards. Officer Tyler Bury received the Merit Commendation for his outstanding action during a burglary incident. On Tuesday, May 15, 2018 at approximately 0500 hours, Officer Tyler Bury was on patrol. While returning to Malvern Borough after assisting East Whiteland Police Department on a business alarm came across two subjects running across Route 30. Both subjects were running armed with long rifles in hand. Officer Bury ordered both subjects to stop, they continued to flee towards the railroad tracks heading south into the woods. This alerted the East Whiteland Police of the burglary. Officer Bury furthered his actions which led to the capture of one of the subjects. An extensive search for the second actor was conducted for a few hours. The second subject was captured in Malvern Borough.

Officer Daniel Sheridan received the Life Saving Commendation for his actions on May 20, 2018. Officer Sheridan assisted the Willistown Police with a female subject who suffered multiple wounds, deep to her neck, arms, and wrists. The person's breathing was weak and was losing consciousness. Officer Sheridan, who is a trained EMT immediately began life saving treatment tending to the wounds to slow the bleeding. Officer Sheridan's outstanding performance in the line of duty, his application, experience and specialized training directly saved this person's life.

The excellent performance of these two Officers reflects a high degree of competence and professionalism and is in keeping with the highest standards of Police work and the Malvern Borough Police Department. The Department is proud to award these Officers for their outstanding actions.
