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### Malvern Borough Police Department Recognition



cial and Cultural Equity (R.A.C.E.) Group. He leads by example with respect to diversity and transparency – proudly hiring the department's first female full-time officer and obtaining dashboard and body cameras for all officers.

### **Environmental Advisory Council**

As part of the Environmental Advisory Council, we are always looking for simple home remedies to do our part to keep our planet healthy and our world more sustainable. Here are 3 very straightforward and effortless things we can each do to achieve that goal:

### An alternative disposal to putting yard waste in the trash

With the change of the season upon us, many people are looking to clean up their property for the winter months. It is easy to dispose of your yard waste in the trash- but there are other, more environmentally healthy alternatives which keep this waste out of landfills. Consider keeping leaves on your lawn as long as possible. They provide a natural habitat for worms, chipmunks, salamanders and other critters. The borough offers leaf pickups throughout November. The leaves are picked up from the road and are hauled off to compost. Composting is another way for you to make use of your yard debris. Mix three parts of brown leaves, branches, and other dead yard waste with one part of green materials such as food waste. This will produce nutrients that can be used to feed your flower and vegetable gardens.

## What does a winter garden look like? Is anything even alive in there?

To many, a winter garden may look untidy or like something that "needs cleaning up." But a winter garden, which is essentially a garden that has been left alone, provides rich habitat for birds, pollinators, and pest-eating insects, especially if it contains native plants. A winter garden's true beauty comes from the life emanating from the dried flowers, leaves, and twigs. Nothing goes unused.

The "seed heads" from flowers that once colored our yards now feed birds who become our winter color. Thickets of dead plant material protect native bees from cold and predators, so they can pollinate our gardens during the blooming season. Most butterflies don't migrate. Instead, they shelter under leaf litter, tree bark, or rocks. Or they overwinter as chrysalises hanging from dried leaves, waiting to emerge in spring. Predatory insects, like ladybugs that eat garden pests, hibernate in a winter garden's warmth, keeping your pest control on site, ready to knock back pest populations early in the spring.

-Zoe Warner Healthy alternatives to salt: Winterize your sidewalk and driveways The most environmentally friendly tactic to remove snow and decrease the ice is good of shoveling. But try to shovel frequently during a storm, when the snow is easier to move and you are not lifting but instead pushing it. Deicers claiming to be Eco friendly are usually a mixture of different kinds of salts to lessen the effects that one type of salt alone would cause. Sodium chloride, calcium chloride and magnesium chloride are the three most common types. New ideas: Sand, woodchips and birdseed work well as they cause friction. Butuse sand sparingly as it can clog drains and be messy once the snow melts. Spread dried coffee grounds or the ash from the fireplace/firepit. These absorb the sunlight and melt snow and ice. Spread a pickle brine and beet juice mixture. Alfalfa meal (yes- the fertilizer!) is super effective when used in moderation. Make a mix of 2 lbs of salt + 1 gallon of water + a glass of sugar beet juice. Be creative and challenge your inner scien-

### Malvern Historical Commission

At the September 21, 2021 meeting of Borough Council, the Commission announced the eighth annual Preservation Awards, and presented same to the building owners who were present.

#### Adaptive Re-Use:

24 South Warren Avenue (rear). This Late Victorian Frame Vernacular style building was originally home to a grave memorials business started in 1899 that continued under different owners for nearly one hundred years. For much of that time the business was operated, first by Joseph Annear and then, after his death, by his widow, Catherine Annear. The National Bank of Malvern purchased it in 1982 and rents it as residential space.

116 E. King Street. This masonry building t was built around 1890 in the Late Victorian Second Empire Style. At various times in its history, it housed Samuel Teamer's harness shop and the Duffryn Mawr-Malvern newspaper. It is currently the home of Uzman Engineering.

#### Commercial:

109 E. King Street. This building was built in 1875 in the Italianate style to be a residence. It appears on the 1881 map of Malvern and, later became the site from which William E. Downing operated Phelps Plumbing and Heating for over 35 years. Today, it houses Sacco's hair salon.

121/123 E. King Street. This building, now known as the home of the Flying Pig, is the 16th oldest building still standing in Mal-

storehouse. It served as a general store (and, briefly, as Malvern's post office) for many years until, shortly after the repeal of Prohibition, it was reinvented as a bar by Louis G. Thomas, Sr. More than 80 years later, it's still a fine old small town bar.

#### Residential:

17 and 19 Powelton Avenue. Both halves of this lovely and well-maintained duplex were built around 1920 on property once owned by Josiah Roberts. Barbara Leighton owns 17 Powelton, and Mayor David Burton and his wife, Linda, own 19 Powelton.

145 Woodland Avenue. The land on which this Late Victorian residence rests was part of the sold to David Evans by farmer Issac Ruth in the 1870s. Evans sold this tract to Robert Everett, founder of Philadelphia's first Sunday newspaper, the Sunday Dispatch, who built the present house around 1890 to be his retirement home. It is now the residence of the Doughty family.

336 W. First Avenue. This Colonial Revival style home, owned by Sheron Bitsko and the late Ralph Bitsko, was built in the early 1930s. The land on which it was build was part of a 32-acre parcel sold by the Harry B. Rosengarten Estate later known as Malvern Heights.

### Frequently Asked Questions

# 1. Where do I find contact information for elected and appointed officials?

All members of Borough Council and the Mayor have their own email address. They are listed on the Borough website in the "Borough Council & Mayor" section. Each committee, with certain exceptions as governed by law, has its own centralized email address. These are distributed to either the chair or the chair's designee (e.g., secretary). The email addresses are as follows:

Planning Commission – malvernmpc@malvern.org
Historical Commission – malvernborohistory@malvern.org
Parks & Recreation Committee – malvernparks&rec@malvern.org
Shade Tree Commission – malvernstc@malvern.org

### 2. What is "Executive Session"?

Meetings of the Borough are governed by the PA Sunshine Law and are advertised and open to the public. The law grants Borough Council authority to meet on certain items for discussion in a closed meeting called "Executive Session." Topics that may be discussed in Executive Session include:

- Personnel matters
- Holding an information, strategy and negotiation session related to the negotiation of a collective bargaining agreement
- Considering the purchase or lease of real property
- Consulting with an attorney about active or pending litigation
- Discussing agency business which, if conducted in public, would violate a lawful privilege or lead to the disclosure of information or confidentiality protected by law
- •Discussing certain public safety issues if disclosure of the information discussed would be reasonably likely to jeopardize or threaten public safety or preparedness or public protection

The specific reason for the Executive Session must be announced in a public meeting either before or directly after the Executive Session. An official action must be taken in an open, public meeting.

### 3. How do you I obtain copies of records?



The release of records is governed by the PA Right-to-Know Act. In addition, the Borough has adopted a policy governing the release records in connection to this law. Request for records must be made on either the Borough's request form or the blanket form created by the PA Office of Open Records. There are fees associated with receiving copies of records and these may be found on the Borough's adopted fee schedule. The law does prohibit the release of certain records, including the release of people's personal identification information (e.g., email address, phone number, social security number), records relating to investigations (both criminal and non-criminal), and predecisional deliberations. Additionally, other state and federal laws protect certain records from being released.

# 4. Am I able to schedule a matter before Borough Council as an agenda item?

Yes. Residents and taxpayers who wish to have a matter placed on the agenda of Borough Council may make the request in writing to the Borough Manager by 12:00 pm the Friday before the meeting. Borough Council also has a "Public Forum" at the end of each meeting where items not on the agenda may be brought before Borough Council. Borough Council also takes public comment on each agenda item.

#### 5. Where may I obtain budgetary information?

Information regarding the Borough's annual budget is available on the Borough website in the "Budgets & Audits" section. Borough Council traditionally holds two (2) budget presentations during the preparation of the budget. These presentations are held during regular public meetings.

#### 6. When are the meetings held?

All meeting dates are available on the Borough's website. The meeting schedule is publicly advertised each year. Meetings are held as follows:

- Borough Council—1st & 3rd Tuesday each month at 7:30 pm
- Planning Commission—1st & 3rd Thursday at 7:30 pm
- Zoning Hearing Board—4th Monday at 7:00 pm (as needed)
- Historical Commission—2nd & 4th Tuesday at 7:30 pm
- Shade Tree Commission—3rd Monday at 3:00 pm
- Parks & Recreation Committee—1st Wednesday at 7:00 pm

All meetings are held at Malvern Borough Hall (1 E. 1st Ave., Malvern, PA 19355).
