Malvern Borough

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Borough Council Member Appointed

Borough Council appointed Dr. Zoe Warner, Ph.D. at their July 18, 2023 meeting. Council Member Marty Laney recently resigned as of May 31, 2023. Dr. Warner will be entitled to hold the office until a successor is elected at the November 7, 2023 municipal general election.



Malvern Borough Post Office Stormwater Capital Improvement Project:

The Malvern Borough Post Office recently renewed their lease for five (5) years extending their contract and services in Malvern Borough until September 2028. The Post Office underwent a major stormwater capital improvement project to alleviate flooding that was occurring due to failing stormwater infrastructure.

A total of \$9,500 was approved and utilized in American Rescue Plant Act (ARPA) funding to pay for a portion of the work, as well as receiving \$41,984.74 from the Borough's insurance carrier, resulting in \$13,828.63 being paid out of Malvern Borough's Capital Expenditures to retain this important asset to the Malvern Borough Community. The total spent on the project to date is \$65,313.37.

Main Street Revitalization Task Force

Borough Council appointed a five (5) member Main Street Revitalization Task Force at their June 6, 2023 meeting pursuant to Resolution No. 845. There were a total of eleven (11) application submissions. The Task Force members are Chairman Eric Rea, Vice Chair Christy Campli, Secretary Tina Corrado, Lynne D. Frederick, and Meghan Miller. The Main Street Revitalization Task Force is responsible for creating a recommendation to Borough Council on how best to address the revitalization of King Street and working closely with the Malvern Business Professional Association to ensure a successful outcome.



Borough Trash Update & Composting in the Borough

The Borough Trash Contract, which was up for renewal July 1, 2023, was going to increase exponentially from our previous contract we had 5 years ago. The cost for two times per week service would have been an almost \$200,000 in-

crease. The bids we received came in higher all around, but in order to keep the cost down, we reached out to residents receive feedback on a once a week pick up. The consensus from all who reached out to the Borough or those who came to our Council Meetings, was to switch to a one time per week pickup to avoid raising taxes or to have residents pay a yearly fee. The saving to a once a week service was \$133,263, this kept us close to the cost we had incurred during our previous contract. Unfortunately, this came at a bad time for trash haulers in general. A.J. Blosenski, who was the lowest bidder and awarded the contract, is going through an ownership transition and had over 20 drivers in our area retire. They are working to hire more help and have brought in drivers from other areas to assist. This has resulted in some confusion on what will be picked up and which are the appropriate containers/bags to place it in. We are working with Blosenski to rectify the problems And ask for patience during this transition. This contract was not an easy decision for Council to make and we have tried to communicate with residents, in different capacities, the issues all local townships and boroughs are facing due to the econom-





In January 2023, we sent a notice out to residents to volunteer for our Composting Pilot Program with Back to Nature Composting. We looked for 50 households who would be interested in composting for the year, free of charge, to see how it would affect both the environment and reduce trash. The first quarter report came in and the numbers were amazing! Participants were able to compost 4,638 pounds of trash so far! We will continue to gather data over the year and see how much of a positive impact this has on our Borough. Shade Tree Commission

Do you like to hear singing birds? Plant a native tree!

All trees provide major benefits to our community. They provide cooling shade in the face of very hot summers, even lowering the temperature of the streets in front of our homes as much as 30 degrees on a hot summer day. They lessen the strain and expense of our air conditioners and lower our energy usage. Trees absorb water runoff, acting much like a giant sponge—drawing in water during our deluges and using it slowly over time. They provide beauty and a nesting place for our birds. They sequester carbon in their wood and roots, and provide oxygen for us to breathe.

AND, if you plant a native tree, you can do even more for our birds and other wildlife. Here's how it works:

It's difficult to imagine how many insects are needed to support our cardinals, titmice, catbirds, sparrows, chickadees and bluebirds. And if you want to keep these birds in your yard, there are key "bird feeder" trees that will support them the most.

Choose white oak trees (Quercus alba), American plum, black cherry and chokecherry (Prunus), River birch (Betula nigra), Sugar or Silver maple (Acer), crabapple (Malus) and willow (Salix). These trees support the caterpillar species that enable our birds to reproduce and raise their young. You have so many options, and your bird friends will thank you.

For those of you who have planted a tree in the last 12 – 18 months, please remember to keep it watered during hot, dry weeks. This spring's drought was especially hard on young trees. And if you would like to plant a free tree in your yard, contact the Shade Tree Com-

Do not go to Walgreens to wire money or money transfer. Law enforcement does not accept money wiring, or accept gift cards. Notify Malvern Police if you receive such a call.

If you receive a call where your child or grandchild has been arrested in another State or Country and you need to wire money for them to get an attorney, chances are this too is a scam.

Property Maintenance in Malvern

Hedges, Bushes, Flowers and Trees Along Sidewalks, Walkways

As the hedges, bushes and flowers grow along the sidewalk at your property; please make sure that they don't spread where they obstruct the sidewalk. This makes it difficult, not to mention dangerous, for pedestrians who use the sidewalks. In addition, where vegetation is planted near road intersections, it's important to keep them trimmed back and low, so they don't become a sight hazard to motorists attempting to go through those intersections. If you have trees that hang over your sidewalk, please make sure that there is at least 8 feet clearance from the sidewalk to the bottom of those branches.

Sustainable Secondhand Style

Great style does not have to be costly. As you prepare for back-to-school shopping and summer closet clean-outs, you can save money and help the environment by going to local secondhand stores.

According to Earth.org, "the Average US Consumer Throws Away 81.5lbs of Clothes Every Year." That clothing ends up in landfills and can take several months or years (depending on the material) to biodegrade. So, what is the biggest problem with buying new clothes? Fast fashion. Buying cheap, stylish mass-produced clothes may seem like a great idea—who doesn't love a trendy bargain?----- but these items are often poor quality and only worn for a short time, so they get typically get thrown away.

You can make a difference by supporting local businesses that take donations and offer consignments. Also, many online resale websites allow you the convenience of shopping from home. These options offer quality clothing at a good price and you can sometimes make money by reselling your items.

For back-to-school shopping, secondhand fashion is a perfect option for children. First, you can resell kid and teen clothes at local stores such as Once Upon a Child in Exton and Plato's



Closet (Exton & Paoli). Some stores give incentives such as discounts in-store when you donate items. Additionally, since kids outgrow clothes before they're worn out, secondhand shopping is an opportunity to teach your child about the importance of donating their clothes and reducing their fashion footprint.

For adults, there are several consignment and thrift stores in Chester County. These include Goodwill, Maria Fe's and G&G Unique Consignment Boutique in Malvern as well as the Fashion Xchange in Paoli. You can donate or consign your preloved fashion at these stores, allowing the opportunity for someone else to create new memories with the items.

However, if you prefer the convenience of online shopping, there is Facebook Marketplace and ThredUP. ThredUP's belief is "Thrifting is about more than just finding amazing deals on your favorite brands. It's about shopping with inten-

tion, rejecting throwaway fashion culture, and standing for sustainability." It is also easy to consign with them online as they will send

you prepaid postage for your pre-owned clothes.

When it comes to fashion, why not try secondhand style? You are saving money, and helping to reduce waste as well as the impact on our natural resources. So as you clean out your summer wardrobe and prepare for fall, think of how much fun and beneficial "thrifting" can be as you browse through the racks. Many affordable treasures await you!

HOW CAN I MAKE THE MOST OUT OF MY GARDEN

All kinds of books and articles have been written over the years regarding making our gardens and yards and general space around our homes as environmentally friendly, ecologically protective and sustainable. But how does one get through all the information to really have a basic understanding of what a healthy yard/garden looks like?

What can your yard offer? Sure, there is something satisfying to see a well-groomed, perfectly mowed yard- but did you know that sharing just a small portion of that ground with natures wild-life we can increase by bounds the beauty and biodiversity that that space offers. Transforming a corner or an edge with native plant gardens will bring the color and majesty of birds and butter-flies and insects and other creatures to your home. Not only can

it be a spectacular sight, but you will be revolutionizing your space into a true national park- right in your backyard!! Instead of cleaning up all the debris found in the yard- use it to give shelter or breeding grounds to a multitude of animals. Ladybugs and lacewings nest in the dry sheltered crowns of native grasses. A downed piece of tree bark can be home to hundreds of insects

and arachnoids. And it will add organic beauty to the yard. Don't be so quick to do the spring and fall cleanup in your yard. There are creatures that nestle under leaves and other dead vegetation during the cold months.

Creating an eco-friendly space doesn't have to cost you a thing. Before you run out to the local plant nursery or hardware store, see what already exists in your garden. Then take a walkabout in your neighborhood. One of the secrets of gardeners is that they generally love to share clippings from their gardens. Stop and chat with your neighbors about what is in their garden, what birds and butterflies they are able to attract.

Share plant clippings. These clippings will generally be comfortable in the soil at your home and grow well. Spread them out to give them space to multiple. Use your garden tools or use your fingers. My neighbor showed me that it is ok to play in the dirt and dig with your fingers!! And my clippings have

Finding the right plants and shrubs for your garden space is the key to having an environmentally healthy yard. Planting and harvesting species native to your area will keep your landscape in healthy balance with nature. You can make a match between the plant you choose and the insect or caterpillar or butterfly or bird that you want to attract. You can add color by choosing which animals are attracted to your garden. Choose plants for which animals will pollinate with them. Also-don't forget to use nature as your hardscaping- tree bark, stones, dead or out of season grasses, etc. Animals use these organic materials to nestle in for shelter and protection.

Why native instead of invasive (including tropical, ornamental and exotic) plant species? "To improve a yard's ability to support life, we must use plant species that successfully create the ecological interest on which other life depends" - Douglas Tallamy, Nature's Best Hope. Plants native to the region share an evolutionary history with the plant and animal communities in the ecoregion or "biome" that you are creating. Invasive species simply put- do not play well with others! Invasives outcompete other



species for light, water, nutrients, space and generally have no natural enemies to restrain them, causing great damage to the delicate ecosystem. For plant wildlife, it is devastating. Insects, birds, etc have highly specialized dietary needs

and are generally restricted to eating either one or just a few plant lineages. Creating a novel ecosystem with invasive species, therefore, can have long lasting devastating consequences. A Fun Factmonarch butterflies have adapted to the very important native milkweed. Milkweed produces a toxic protein when eaten by insects. Monarch butterflies, though, have adapted to the toxin and the native species milkweed has become its main source of food. After ingesting the milkweed, the toxin causes the monarch to taste horrible to its predators! This has become the main survival tool for this beautiful garden insect.

A number of **national databases** have been painstakingly created as tools for which native species are best in your area. These allow you to look up native plants according to your zip code: http://www.nwf.org/NativePlantFinder and http://www.Audobon.org/NativePlants

Some native plant ideas for the 19355 zip code:

Black Eyed Susan: Attracts woodpeckers, sparrows, nuthatches

Bluebell-of-Scotland or Witches Thimble: Attracts wood warbles, orioles, mocking birds

American Witch Hazel or Winterbloom-: Attracts finches, jays and grosbeaks

Milkweed: Attracts monarch butterflies

Sugarberry: Attracts hackberry emperor butterflies

Willow or Salix: Attracts 368 species of butterflies and moths

Camphorweed Sweetscent:: Attracts 3 species other species of butterflies and moths
